Field Trip Information

May 16th Field Trip: Sunday - 9am: Brooker Creek Preserve: A good place to see some of Florida's Wild Beauty is at Brooker Creek Preserve, an 8500 wilderness area in the northeast corner of Pinellas County. Our May field trip will be led by Carl & Kathleen Nichter, Interpretative Guides for Brooker Creek and Florida Master Naturalists. We will do the Flatwoods trail which is 1.5 miles long and using their plant survey list will look for Florida native plants. They will also tell us some of the history of this beautiful park. We will meet at the Education Center near the parking area. Directions: The Preserve is located at 3940 Keystone Road (CR 582), Tarpon Springs, FL 34688. 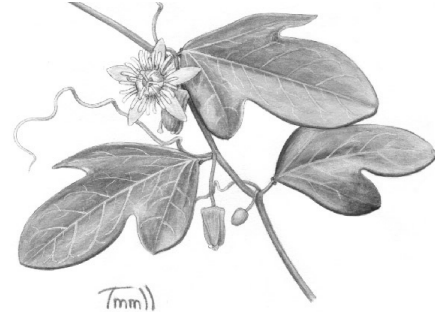
CORKYSTEM PASSION-VINE

Botanical Name: *Passiflora suberosa*

Common Name: Corkystem or Corky-stemmed
Passion-Vine or Passionflower

Family: Passifloraceae (Passionflower)



Type of Plant: Native herbaceous perennial vine, twining by axillary tendrils, and with smaller greenish flowers and purple-black fruits, versus the more common and showy *Passiflora incarnata*, or Maypop, which has large purple flowers and yellow fruits. Will spread by self-sown seed or slowly by root suckers. **Height:** Prostrate or climbing. **Spread:** 3 – 15 ft.

How to Identify: **Leaves:** Alternate, entire or 3 – lobed. **Flowers:** Usually solitary in the leaf axils, yellow-green with some purple; petals lacking; about ½ in. wide. **Flowering Time:** Late spring – summer into fall; year-round in south Florida. **Fruit:** Purplish-black berry when mature in summer; edible (similar in size and shape to an olive).

Habitat: Hammocks, pinelands, rockland pinelands, coastal strand, shell middens, roadsides and ruderal (disturbed) sites.

Distribution: Nearly throughout Florida, primarily in the southern 2/3rds of the peninsula. **Hardiness Zones:** 8B – 11.

Landscape Use / Wildlife Benefit: Well-suited as a groundcover in sunny or shady sites or as a climbing vine on trellis, arbor, or fence. Larval host plant for the Zebra (formerly known as Zebra Longwing, Florida's state butterfly), Gulf Fritillary, and Julia butterflies. The fruits also attract birds. May be grown in large containers.

Cultivation: Easily grown in a wide variety of sites. **Soil:** Most any well-drained, acid to alkaline. Prefers fertile, organic soils, but tolerates poor, sandy soils. **Light:** Full sun – full shade; will flower and fruit better with at least partial sun. **Water:** Dry to moist. Do not overwater! Drought-tolerant and will survive on rainfall once established (Note: vines may take up to 3 years to establish). **Miscellaneous:** Prune as needed to control size. Does not tolerate regular mowing. Salt-tolerant. Dies back each winter and regrows each spring – with a passion!

Propagation: By seed (may take months to germinate), by root or stem cuttings, or by layering,

Report: Nature Coast Coalition Meeting by Jan Howie, Secretary NCC

On Sat., Feb. 27th I attended the third meeting of the Nature Coast Coalition. The coalition consists of several environmental organizations in the Nature Coast (from Wakulla Cty in the North to Pasco Cty in the South) who have come together to support each other with the environmental causes in their respective regions, and to bring a unified effort in support of the causes that we all share, such as off-shore oil drilling, clean water, Florida Forever, and managed growth. The idea is that the force of several voices together is more powerful than one or two alone.

Sue Mullins, lobbyist for FNPS and several other environmental groups, spoke and was very impressive not only in her knowledge of the functioning of the State Legislature but also of environmental issues facing the State. To influence our Legislature she suggested to visit the legislator in person when he/she is in town or write a personal letter that is brief and in big font. FAX's are good because staffers can't delete them or to ignore a lot of paper coming in. Group e-mails have little effect. It is better to write a personal e-mail message of 1-2 sentences and put "I support..." in the subject heading. Legislators read newspaper blogs, so it is good to blog to articles and editorials in them. They are all on Facebook and read what people write to them, as well as watch U-Tube videos. Extremely important issues will face the Legislature this session; we can try using these suggestions to have our voices heard.
